HISTORY HAPPENS

At our February, 2016 Club meeting we decided we would add a history article to our newsletter under the heading "History Happens." This artical is from Wikipedia and is about Ed Cole who is also known as the father of the Corvair.

ED COLE

Ed Cole became General Manager of the Chevrolet Division of GM in 1956. As the Chevy GM he directed the development of the Corvair. Ed was the son of a dairy farmer. As a teenager he became a field rep for a tractor company. After a stint at a junior college he went to GMI for his engineering degree.

His first big accomplishment was to assist in the development of the new Cadillac V-8 engine in 1949. In the 1952 he was involved in GM's developing a self propelled, twin barreled, 40 mm anti-aircraft gun called the M-42. Before he became involved in the Corvair development he was the chief engineer at Chevrolet and hit a winner in the development of the new small block V-8 that that was installed in the 1955 Chevrolet. In 1956 he became the GM of Chevy and the Corvair became his baby. He was impressed with the durability of the air cooled engines powering his airplanes. Seeing what VW and Porsche were doing with rear mounted air cooled engines and his familiarity with this type of engine he helped steer the Corvair in that direction. A lot of discussion took place over it being a 4 cylinder or a 6 cylinder. The 6 was

ultimately chosen for its better smoothness. Strong early sales of the Corvair earned him a cover on the October 5, 1959 issue of Time magazine. Later on he became involved in the development of the Vega aluminum engine. This one did not hit the bulls eye as did the small block V-8.

After retirement from GM he became involved with several other endeavors including CEO of Checker Motors and International Husky, an air freight company. Sadly at the age of 67 he died when his twin engine, British built, Beagle-206 airplane crashed in bad weather near Kalamazoo. Michigan. Wikipedia was the source for this information.

Directions to the club meeting at:

Vandalia Justice Center -

Coming from the east the Justice Center is just down the side road from the Wendy's restaurant that is located on Rt-40 just west of the Vandalia exit from I-70. This side road at Wendy's is James Bohanan Dr. The street address of the justice center is 245 Bohanan Dr. From the west turn left at the BP station turn right on J.E. Bohanan Dr. The Justice Center door is on the east side of the building. Go in the side door and through the door to the dispatch center. The meeting room is to the left past the dispatcher. A public parking lot is available at the corner of James E. Bohanon Dr. and Maple St. behind the bank and some street parking is available. Note: The room is on the west side of the building. If some of the club members are already there you may be able to enter through the side door to the room. They can let you in or may have the door blocked open.

Vandalia Historical Society Meeting House/Shelter -It is only 2 minutes from the Justice Center. It is located at 336 East Alkaline Springs Road. From the Justice Center (or I-75) drive west on National Road to the Dixie Drive Highway intersection. Turn left (south) onto Dixie Drive and continue on Dixie to the stoplight at Elva Court then continue on Dixie to the next street on your left (just past the Vandalia-Butler High School), and turn left (east) onto East Alkaline Springs Road. You will see the City Art Park on your right and just past the park is a long wood picket fence in front of the Society property. Turn right into the driveway and drive back around the barn to the parking area and the Meeting House / Shelter. There are restrooms in the Meeting House if needed. It would be a good idea to bring your mask for that additional step of protection.
